

## Mark 11

### I. Jesus revealed as King of Israel. Vs. 1-11

A. Jesus reveals himself as the King of Israel to those who understood the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9.

“Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem: behold, thy King cometh unto thee: he is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass, and upon a colt the foal of an ass.”

B. At the Mount of Olives, Jesus sends two of his disciples to get a colt. Vs. 1-6

1. The colt would be tied at the door of the first house in a village near them. Vs. 2
2. The colt had never been ridden. V. 2
3. They were to loose the colt and take him to Jesus. 2-3
4. They found the colt tied by the door in a place where two ways met. Vs. 4-6

C. The disciples brought the colt to Jesus. Vs. 7

1. They cast their garments on the colt. Vs. 7
2. Jesus sat upon the colt. Vs. 7

D. Jesus rode the colt into Jerusalem. Vs. 8-11

1. Many spread their garment in the way. Vs. 8
2. Others cut down branches off the trees and laid them in the way. Vs. 8
3. The people cried “Hosanna; blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord: blessed be the kingdom of our father David, that cometh in the name of the Lord: Hosanna in the highest.” Vs. 9-10
4. Jesus went into the temple in Jerusalem. Vs. 11
5. Jesus looked round about at all things. Vs. 11
6. Jesus left and went to Bethany with the twelve. Vs. 11

### II. Jesus and the fig tree curse. Vs. 12-14

A. The next day Jesus went back to Jerusalem from Bethany. Vs. 12

B. Jesus saw a fig tree, and he was hungry. Vs. 13

C. Jesus found leaves on the fig tree but no fruit. Vs. 13

1. There should have been fruit since it was not time for the fruit to be plucked off. Vs. 13

D. Jesus said that no one would ever eat fruit of that fig tree. Vs. 14

### III. Jesus and cleansing of the temple. Vs. 15-19

A. Jesus cast out those who sold and bought in the temple. Vs. 15

B. Jesus turned over the tables of the money changers. Vs. 15

C. Jesus removed those who sold doves. Vs. 15

D. Jesus would not let anyone carry a vessel through the temple.  
Vs. 16

E. Jesus taught, "Is it not written, My house shall be called of all nations the house of prayer? but ye have made it a den of thieves."

F. The scribes and chief priests sought how to destroy Jesus. Vs. 18

G. Jesus left Jerusalem. Vs. 19

### IV. The lesson from the withered fig tree. Vs. 20-26

A. The next morning Jesus went back to Jerusalem. Vs. 1

B. The disciples saw the fig tree dried up from the roots. Vs. 20

C. Jesus told them to have faith in God. Vs. 21

D. They were to pray believing, without any doubt, and it would be answered. Vs.23-24

E. When you pray, you are to forgive others. Vs. 25

F. If you do not forgive others, neither will God forgive you. Vs. 26

### V. Jesus' authority questioned. Vs. 27-33

A. Jesus enters the temple in Jerusalem. Vs. 27

B. The chief priest, scribes and the elders asked him, "By what authority doest thou these things? and who gave thee this authority to do these things?"

C. Jesus said, if they would answer his question, then he would answer theirs. Vs. 29

D. Jesus asked them "The baptism of John, was it from heaven, or of men?" Vs. 30

E. They would not answer his question, and he would not answer theirs. Vs. 31-33
